## Editorial

As we approach the beginning of the festive season, we wish our readers a happy Diwali and a happy Christmas.

The International Coastal Clean up in September / October was carried out with great enthusiasm and meticulous planning in Pune and other cleanup sites in India.

An IMF seminar on 'Security Management of India's Seaborne Traffic and Offshore Installations' was held on 25 September 2014 and received a very good response.

The Navy has always been regarded as the Senior Service in Britain. By contrast, in India we have traditionally looked up to the Army as the Senior Service, or perhaps the only service until the beginning of WW II. But with the information that has come to light, the debate about the 'seniority' of the services is sure to take an interesting twist. Mr John Long has written an article about the Memorial in Alrewas, Staffordshire, UK, where there are two separate memorial plates – one for the Indian Army and the other for the Royal Indian Navy, (Why was the army not called the Royal Indian Army, one wonders). The Army plaque covers the period 1746 to 1857 (The Honourable East India Company) and 1857 to 1947 (The Crown). The Navy plaque covers an unbroken period from 1612 to 1947.

Incredible as it may sound, the Navy appears to have a seniority of 134 years over the Army.

The date of birth of the Indian Marine (also known as the Hon East India Company's Marine) is generally accepted as 5th September 1612, when a squadron of British ships arrived off Surat.

We are looking forward to an interesting exchange of views on this subject.

Some good news - The International Chamber of Shipping (ICS), has announced that the total Green House Gas emissions from global maritime transport are estimated to have been over 20% lower in 2012 than in 2007.

The global shipping industry, which transports by sea around 90% of all world trade, is thought to have produced only about 2.2% of the world's total GHG emissions during 2012 compared to 2.8% in 2007.

This is the centenary year of the WWI. To mark the occasion, the IMF arranged a screening of the movie *All Quiet on the Western Front* at the Boat club in Pune. We are also giving more coverage to the two world wars, (and consequently slightly more weightage to the 'Defence' section) in this issue to remember and honour the brave soldiers of both sides who fought in these wars.

### Obituary –

Dr Shanti Patel

Eminent freedom-fighter, veteran trade unionist and former parliamentarian Shanti Patel died in Mumbai recently. He was 93. He is survived by his son Yatin and daughters Mrinal and Minal. Patel was associated with the shipping industry for over six decades and was a trustee of Mumbai Port Trust for 62 years. He served as the President of National Union of Seafarers of India (NUSI) for over 40 years till his death and also as the Mayor of Mumbai in 1970-71. During his stewardship of NUSI, Patel championed the cause of workers and sailors movement nationally and internationally, especially the seafarers.
